COURSE GUIDELINES & EXPECTATIONS

There are a number of components to this course.

<u>Class Time</u>: There will be two hours of class per week, on Tuesday evenings from 5:30-7:30pm. That time will be used for in-class lecture when the weekly topic requires close instruction and, alternately, will be used for in-class discussions and testing. This is a blended class, so the expectation is that there is **additional but flexible work** required of your outside of the two hours of weekly class time.

<u>Lectures</u>: Weekly lectures will be presented during class time, will use the white-board for diagrams and explanations, and will give you an opportunity to ask questions about the content. Lecture material will also be available online for you to read and use for studying purposes. As a result, there is no textbook required for this course.

<u>Discussions</u>: There will be three in-class discussions this term. The first will be on Sustainable Development Goals (SDG) on **February 3rd**, the second will be on Old Growth Forestry on **March 19th**, and the third will be on Fisheries on **April 2nd**. These discussions will require you to have <u>read the materials provided in advance</u>, to have prepared notes and points for discussion, to discuss the topic in small groups, and to turn in your contributions in at the end of class. For this component of the course, use of Artificial Intelligence is allowed; it is useful to organize the material for discussion.

<u>Assignments</u>: There are ten assignments in the course. Each one contains exercises to familiarize students with environmental issues, government and non-profit web sites, and the tools of geographic analysis. Most assignments, due to their use of Internet information will require computer access and can be done off-site but those that require supplies and supervision will be done during the Wednesday class block. Each assignment will have specified due dates and it is expected that each student submits their own work**, either online or in person.

<u>Term Paper</u>: You will be asked to write a short paper this term on the 2021 BC Supreme Court case Yahey vs. British Columbia, a precedent-setting ruling the legality of industrial extraction (logging, mining, gas & oil extraction) on the territories of the Blueberry First Nation in northeast BC. It will be assigned in mid-February and will be due on **Tuesday, March 25**th.

<u>Tests</u>: There will be two tests this term. The midterm exam will be on **Tuesday, February 11th** and the final exam will be during **Camosun's exam week in April**. The final exam schedule will be posted in February, and it is your job to ensure you are available to attend. Attendance is mandatory. If you fall sick or find yourself unable to attend the exam due to calamity, you must notify the instructor in advance of the exam.

<u>Late Assignment Policy</u>: Each assignment will be due in-class, or electronically by the specified date and time. If you are turning in your assignment in-person, you have a week grace period – I must receive it before the marked assignments are handed back the following week. If you are handing in electronically and you missed the closing date, you may print your assignment and hand it in the following class. Emailed assignments will not be considered.

**Cheating: I will assign a zero-grade to any assignment submitted that uses another person's work directly. That includes copying from another person, copying from a website, or copying from an AI content generator. Because it is time consuming to handle cheated assignments, the balance of proof that you didn't cheat will fall to you – if I flag your assignment for cheating, you will have the opportunity to speak to me before the zero grade is finalized and you will need to prove you didn't copy your answer. I will determine that by asking you a series of verbal questions about the answer you provided and the broader topic it was exploring.
