COURSE GUIDELINES & EXPECTATIONS

There are several components in this course.

Lecture: Each week will have lectures on Tuesdays from 3:30 to 5:20. These lectures will be accompanied with pictures, graphs, and videos so that concepts are easy to grasp. Attendance is not a component of your grade in this class but will be essential to your success in this course.

Labs: There are 10 labs in the course. Generally, there will be one assignment completed per lecture topic. Lab assignments may vary but will largely be based on class and group discussions and activities. It is expected that you attend weekly. Labs have assigned due dates, and it is expected that each student submits their own work.

Tests: There will be three theory tests. They will all happen during lecture time. The first test is on Tuesday, October 1st and the second test is on Tuesday, November 5th. The third test will be scheduled during the final College Exam Week and will be announced when the schedule becomes available. Each test will have a selection of short-answer, multiple-choice, matching, and short essay-type questions. Attendance is mandatory.
