List of topics:

The course is organized into ten topics:

Topic 1. Basic concepts in human geography

• This topic introduces the field of geography, its basic concepts and approaches, and major geographical methodologies and philosophical thoughts.

Topic 2. Spatial analysis

• This topic focuses on methods of spatial analysis in human geography. An important objective is to develop an understanding of thematic maps.

Topic 3. Globalization processes

• This topic investigates the spatial processes of globalization. It examines the nature of transnational corporations and their influence on the international division of labour. It explores the consequences of globalization for the development gap and the natural environment.

Topic 4. Cultural geographies

• This unit outlines the fundamental concepts of cultural geography. It discusses the geographical origins, distribution and spatial distribution and impacts of major languages and religions. It examines the relationships between culture and the physical environment and emphasizes the implications for sustainability.

Topic 5. <u>Population geography</u>

• This unit examines the key indicators and issues of demographic structure, population policies and distribution in both developed and developing countries. The patterns, factors and explanations of migration at local, regional, and international scales are also highlighted.

Topic 6. Food and agriculture

• This unit focuses on the spatial patterns of production, distribution, and consumption of agricultural product. It examines the impact of global trade on agriculture. It emphasizes the challenges of providing food security in developing countries and the links between agriculture and climate change.

Topic 7. Economic development

• This unit focuses on the spatial patterns of production, distribution, and consumption of primary, secondary and tertiary activities. The lectures review the factors and locational models of manufacturing activities and the indicators and explanations of economic development.

Topic 8. Political geography

• This topic focuses on functions of political systems with particular emphasis on the evolution of the state, boundary conflicts, and geopolitical strategies and issues.

Topic 9. Urbanization

• This unit highlights the spatial organizations and functions of urban systems in the world. It examines the processes of urban growth in core countries with a special emphasis on Canadian urbanization.

Topic 10. Inside cities: Urban structure

• This unit first examines the structure of cities in North America, providing a focus on the challenges facing Canadian cities. It then examines the structural problems caused by rapid urban growth in developing countries.

COURSE GUIDELINES & EXPECTATIONS

Class attendance

This is a blended delivery with one weekly class session. Regular attendance to these classes is expected. These classes are meant to introduce the main concepts of human geography, explain the lab exercises, and promote discussions. The course material, including lecture summaries and slides, are posted on D2L. Students are expected to check D2L announcements and read the course material on a regular basis.

Due dates and late assignments

Due dates for assignments are listed in the course schedule. For you to progress effectively in the course, it is important to respect those dates. You are also expected to write quizzes and midterms on the dates indicated in the course schedule. As you do your work on time, you will receive from me a timely feedback on your work.

Note that all exercises, quizzes and midterms will be done remotely on D2L. See dates on course schedule. Tests will open at 7:00am on the assigned date and normally close at 7pm on the same day. You will have a time window of two days to do the exercises. I will provide further explanations in class. Study guides for quizzes and midterms will be posted on D2L.
