COURSE GUIDELINES & EXPECTATIONS

There are a number of components to this course.

<u>Lectures</u>: This is a fully in-person, classroom-based offering. Both Tuesdays and Thursdays will have lecture components to them – it takes a lot of time to 'travel the world'!

<u>Tricks</u>: I am asking each of you to prepare a segment to feature during one week this term. The most obvious option would be to assemble a slideshow of vacation pictures that you have – your demographic has travelled more than most – so pictures from Thailand, Mexico, Cuba, Australia or any other destination would be a casual and welcome addition to the lecture on that region. If you haven't travelled, you can prepare an educational slide show – in the past students have profiled the making of Ukrainian Easter eggs, hide tanning in Morocco, the Sami people of Finland, the Falklands war, K-pop, wild apples in Kazakhstan, and the formation and distribution of cenotes...anything is a good idea...and this is meant to be a low-stakes, enjoyable activity. Everyone is asked to do one Trick during the term; and, you all have the option to do up to five – if you do, you no longer have to do the term project, the Travel Itinerary.

<u>Assignments</u>: There are ten assignments in the course all of which focus on specific aspects of each of the regions we cover. You'll be given a week to complete a series of questions that pertain to a topic or a locale and your submissions will be due either in-class or in the D2L Assignment Folder on Thursday evenings by 10:00pm.

<u>Travel Itinerary Project</u>: You will be asked to create a detailed travel itinerary. This will likely be a portfolio submission that contains maps, schedules, travel routings and destination descriptions. You'll need to clear your routing for your hypothetical trip – a trip that must be overland and not use air travel. You will decide upon a theme for the trip: architecture, cultural markets, language or religious diversity, national parks, resource industries, etc.

and you will plan and describe the best way to pursue this theme in your region. This assignment is worth 20% of your final grade and should not be underestimated. As stated earlier, you have the option to do five Tricks over the term and, if you do, you will no longer be required to do this assignment.

<u>Tests</u>: There will be three tests this term, the first one will be on Tuesday, **February 15**th, the second on Tuesday, **March 21**st, and the third on Thursday, **April 14**th. Each test will have a selection of short-answer, multiple-choice, and short essay-type questions. There is no final exam during Exam Week for this course.
