CALENDAR DESCRIPTION

This course explores the nature and function of Earth's atmosphere. Topics include atmospheric composition and structure, insolation, atmospheric circulation, humidity and precipitation, and weather systems. Climate diversity and change (natural and anthropogenic) will be examined in detail. Lab activities will introduce methods for sampling and analyzing weather and climate data.

There are multiple components to this course.

Readings:

Readings are optional but provide indispensable depth and context, and a different perspective on the subject matter. Reading assignments are detailed below. If you opt to use a textbook other than Ahrens, make sure you are reading the relevant chapters for the week's material.

Labs:

There are ten labs to complete. We have scheduled lab time from 10:30 to 12:20 on Thursdays. Consistent participation will improve the learning experience and increase the odds of success for you and everyone else. Please read the lab assignments ahead of time. Computer access will be required for most of the assignments as you will be referencing a variety of websites and data sources.

Weather Project:

Students will monitor the local weather for a week and analyse what happened using weather data and maps. The project requires a formal written report. See details in the project handout.

Tests:

There will be three theory tests that covers both lecture and lab content. The format for these will be a combination of multiple choice, short answer, and long answer questions. Exams #1 and Exam #2 will be given during lab times on Thursdays. The first exam is October 3rd, Exam #2 is on November 7th and Exam # 3 will be given during the Final Exam Period, TBA.
