CALENDAR DESCRIPTION

Students will learn about local protocols and the importance of community self-determination. Students introduced to a range of traditional teachings, frameworks and concepts of community wellness. They will learn from Old Ones and Knowledge Keepers and begin to create, or enhance, their personal philosophies of wellness. This course is rooted within Land and Water-based teachings, and students will learn within community and in the classroom.

COURSE GUIDELINES & EXPECTATIONS

This interactive course uses a variety of teaching/learning strategies, lectures, discussion, co-operative learning, and guest speakers. Please arrive at class on time and be prepared to participate in discussions and activities. Classes planned as a continuum for building the skill and knowledge required to meet the

competencies for ICW Graduates. Students are required to contact the instructor in advance if they are unable to attend classes.

Attendance and Engagement:

Students supported to attend all classes and to participate in class discussions and activities in a good way. They will be supported to come to class prepared with readings done and will engage in self-reflection and self-regulation. Students supported to practice wellness, reciprocity, setting healthy boundaries with one another. Students encouraged developing good habits of being good wellness workers.

Location Paper:

Students supported to write a 5–7-page location paper, which will articulate their personal values, worldviews, and what culture means to you. Specifically, students will identify who you are, where you are from, who your family is, what your pronouns are, what your gifts are, challenges that you have overcome in your life, areas that you would like to work on. Students encouraged, thinking about their own wellness, and what has helped them to become who they are today? **October 3rd Due**.

Creation Stories:

Students supported to work in groups or 2-3 and research and share creation stories; this does not have to be your own. Students will be encouraged to learn about other creation stories and if they know theirs well, to identify similarities and differences. Students will supported to identify the people whose creation story they are covering and help us to understand as much about the people, their location, language, ceremonies and anything that connects the people to their creation story. Students supported to think about and reflect on why our creation stories are important and how they support our wellness and sense of self in the world. **November 14 Due**.
