Temporary Grade	Description
I	<i>Incomplete</i> : A temporary grade assigned when the requirements of a course have not yet been completed due to hardship or extenuating circumstances, such as illness or death in the family.
IP	<i>In progress</i> : A temporary grade assigned for courses that are designed to have an anticipated enrollment that extends beyond one term. No more than two IP grades will be assigned for the same course.
CW	<i>Compulsory Withdrawal</i> : A temporary grade assigned by a Dean when an instructor, after documenting the prescriptive strategies applied and consulting with peers, deems that a student is unsafe to self or others and must be removed from the lab, practicum, worksite, or field placement.

COURSE GUIDELINES & EXPECTATIONS

Students MUST complete/submit each part of the term assignment in order to be able to pass this course.

Attendance: Students are expected to attend all classes. Attendance is mandatory unless you have a medical reason for missing it, in which case you should email the instructor ahead of time to make note of your reason for missing class. Failure to attend the seminar sessions could result in failure of the course.

An excused absence includes:

Absences from Campus due to COVID-19: If a student is feeling unwell, they should inform their instructor that they will be unable to participate in any in-person classes. Another option is to email your question. Questions sent by email must be brief (think the length of a tweet). If it is impossible to reply with a brief response (due to the nature of the question) then you will be asked to make an appointment. Your instructor will respond to emails as quickly as possible, however, please keep in mind that this reply may be delayed when the instructor is tied up with other courses or if it is outside of work hours.
