CALENDAR DESCRIPTION

Students will study the organ level of human body organization, with a focus on the basics of human body anatomy and physiology. The muscular, digestive, and urinary systems, metabolism, and fluid, electrolyte, and acid-base homeostasis will be explored through theoretical knowledge and applied application in a laboratory setting. Open to Massage Therapy students only.

- Explain the interactions between physiological systems of the body as they pertain to exercise
