CALENDAR DESCRIPTION

Students will build a foundation of basic mathematics skills, concepts, vocabulary, and problem-solving strategies to prepare them to meet personal, career, or academic goals. Students will practice processes related to the following topics: place value, rounding, adding, and subtracting whole numbers to 100. Students will build an understanding of automaticity and estimation skills to increase their confidence and competence in mathematics.

COURSE GUIDELINES & EXPECTATIONS

This is a self-paced course. Students have the flexibility to follow an individually-adaptable timeline to complete the learning outcomes and unit tests. This course consists of 6 (online, blended and/or in-person) hours of class time and 4 hours of lab time per week. Lab time includes but is not limited to tutorials with an instructor and/or instructional assistants and using the instructional resources in the Help Centre and library, virtually and in person. The course completion time will vary for each student, depending on a number of factors, including students' current level of math skills, motivation, learning rate, and time devoted to study. Students have a responsibility to work hard, attend class and/or meetings, and ask for support when needed.
