COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES / OBJECTIVES

Upon completion of this course a student will be able to:

- 1. Recognize selected traits of major musical styles of the last two millennia
- 2. Converse with assistance about select major musical styles and the musical contributors who express these styles;
- 3. Review live and recorded musical performances;
- 4. Postulate musical mechanisms which enable the effect of select music on a listener.

- (e) Course work begins on the first day of term. Class meets via Zoom on the first Tuesday of term, 5:30-8:15 Pacific Time. Assignments are due from the opening day of the course.
- (f) Class meetings must be attended as offered. A recording will be made for instructor use only. In order to preserve individual privacy and the integrity of class work, the recording will not be shared.
- (g) A majority of learning in this course is learner-directed. Each learner has broad control over selection of assignments to submit for evaluation. Learners who feel they would like direct instructor support for this portion of the course are kindly asked to identify themselves at the start of the course or as needed throughout the course term.

Class meets every Tuesday evening of term, 5:30-8:15 with a small break around 7:00, Pacific Time using the Zoom link at the top of the course site on D2L. All are expected to:

Most materials can be recovered through instructional videos and class readings. In rare and exceptional circumstances, a rough transcript of the audio from meeting may be available. If it is your custom to make a study-recording during in-person classes, please feel free to take an audio recording and supporting screen shots during the Zoom meeting. Throughout the Term

The course is comprised of 12 Units. Each unit includes instruction (live, video, audio, written) and is followed by a brief Threshold Quiz. The next unit will open to you after its opening date and time, and once you have completed the Threshold Quiz for the previous unit. Plan to complete one unity per week.

Class Meetings	
Weekly Tuesday 5:30-8:15, online, using the Zoom link given on the course NavBar	
At the synchronous session we work together on new topics not covered in the instructional videos. We explore deeply the most important topics of the instructional videos. Perhaps most importantly, we practice skills for engaged listening. You interact with the class using "chat" – have a Notes app open so that you can quickly type out your ideas to scoop them up to drop them in chat. You may interact with the class using your mic. You may interact with the class using your camera. On occasion you may complete work during class time for later submission. Together these pieces form your in-class mark.	10
You must be active in the Zoom classroom to complete your work and gain content. Absences happen. If you must be absent, it is appreciated that you send an email before the class meeting starts. It may be appropriate to waive the week's work depending on the specific circumstance (emergency, documentation, accommodation, technology). The decision to waive in-class work is the instructor's to offer and to make; it is not automatic and will not be normalized.	
Independent Study	
Independent Study is your best path into the music. The ideas, details, and practice from the learning materials and from the synchronous sessions are important, but little compares to you spending alone time with the music.	
Independent Study will be completed through a mix of Deep Study and Quick Study.	
Complete twenty (20) Independent Studies, approximately 1-2 per week.	
Of the twenty (20) required: • Two (2) must be Listening Focus, Deep Study • Two (2) must be Research Focus, Deep Study • One (1) must be Composer Reflection, Deep Study • Up to six (6) may be Quick Study. More may be completed for Extra Credit • The remaining nine (9) Deep Studies may be completed from any category	70
The Independent Study dropbox and gradebook line start at "0." Your mark will grow through the term. Independent Studies are typically marked on Tuesdays or Wednesdays. Feedback will be given. Continue completing and submitting Independent Studies until your mark reaches what you desire.

COURSE GUIDELINES & EXPECTATIONS

It is expected that you will approach this course with curiosity and awareness. It is expected that you will explore music that may be unfamiliar to you and quite different from the music you like. It is expected that you will approach topics with respect, even those which may be difficult for you to work with, and that you will ask for relief if you ever feel any topic places you in an uncomfortable position. It is expected that you will attend each and every synchronous class session and participate both fully and enthusiastically in the discussion throughout the entirety of the session. It is expected that you will complete the homework with diligence and on schedule, and that you will refer to feedback received to foster your best learning. I encourage you to ask questions, seek assistance, engage in conversation, and to assume there is usually a way to solve a problem and perhaps even remake the course materials to meet you where you are and enhance your learning.

The course is intense! The materials take a long time to cover and prepare during a week – music is as long as it is and can't be made shorter. And you may be out of your comfort zone, familiarity, or area of interest for much of the material. I encourage you to be brave and to be curious.

As you plan for the course, please be aware that there is usually a direct correlation between attendance and participation at the weekly meetings and later success with the Threshold Quizzes. Likewise, there is usually a direct correction between success on the Independent Studies (attention to the work, and response to feedback) and your final mark. Attending each class and completing Independent Studies on-time usually makes for a strong final mark. Skipping class, avoiding participation in class sessions, turning in homework late or not at all usually makes for a weak final mark. As a bonus to those who have read this paragraph, email the phrase "quick study" to instructor's email address above before the first scheduled class meeting and gain permission to submit at additional two Quick Studies for credit toward your twenty Independent Studies. Your success in the course is largely in your own hands.
