EVALUATION OF LEARNING

The best **6** (of 10) In-Class Works & the best **2** (of 3) Tests comprise the total of 100 points available. There is one **optional** (5 points available) Bonus item; it will be challenging! In-Class items will involve activities such as discussion and worksheets. Although they will focus on the week's topic(s), they may refer back to material covered earlier in the term. Students must be *present* and *participate* in order to earn marks on these In-Class Works; simply copying other students' work will not be permitted.

ALL TESTS & the bonus item are closed-book, no notes. Just pen, pencil and eraser will be needed.

In-Class Work will be open book and done with assistance and class discussion, as befits the items.

NO WORK CAN BE MADE UP WITHOUT OFFICIAL MEDICAL (or equivalent) excuse presented in timely fashion. There will be no extra-credit options beyond the final Bonus. With excused absences, it is expected that students will work to catch up on material missed by, for example, attending office hours, talking with fellow students and communicating with me by email (via D2L).

Attendance is mandatory but will not be "taken." Students are responsible persons, in charge of themselves!
