CALENDAR DESCRIPTION

This course explores significant philosophical topics in metaphysics, ethics, and political philosophy. Questions likely to be discussed include the following: What is the self? How should we live? Do we have free will? Does our existence have meaning? What makes a society just? Classic and contemporary texts will be studied.

COURSE GUIDELINES & EXPECTATIONS

1. There are two hours of lecture each week on Tuesday and a one hour seminar on Thursday. Please check your registration to find out which seminar hour is yours.
2. The schedule above shows what readings are required for each week. Please note that philosophy needs to be read more than once, and some passages need to be read

many times to be understood. Plan to spend about two hours doing all the readings for the week before the weeks' classes.

3. The first two tests are written in person during regular lecture time. The last test will be written during the final exam period. If you know you will miss a test or have missed a test, contact me as soon as possible to set a date for a makeup. If more than a couple weeks pass, makeups may need to be written at the final exam.
4. The tests in this course will be open book. This means that students may bring their own coursepack and use it during the test. Students may underline, box, and highlight text; however, no more than 6 to 10 words written on no more than 10 to 12 pages.
5. The best plan for success in Philosophy 100 is to keep up with reading and attend lectures and seminars. Reading is really important intellectual work, so please do put in the time. If you get stuck on one essay, do not let that stop you from reading the next. If you miss a lecture or a seminar (or a few), don't let that stop you from showing up when you can.
6. Students do not have my permission to record lectures. Students do not have my permission to take any photos in the classroom. **If digital aids are necessary for you, please see me in advance of their use.** I will happily make arrangements to accommodate real needs.
