COURSE GUIDELINES & EXPECTATIONS

1. The tests in this course will be based on study questions that will require paragraph answers (100 words). The study questions will be handed out in three sets, a few weeks before each exam. There will be 2 - 4 questions for each reading. The tests will be cumulative.

2. There is a one hour seminar each week. Half the class is registered for Seminar A, the other half of the class is registered for Seminar B. Please check your registration to find out which seminar is yours.

3. The work in the seminar includes short hand-written assignments. Please bring paper and a pencil or pen (blue or black). These assignments will only be accepted in class; there are no make up seminar assignments. If you miss, or are going to miss, your seminar you may attend the other seminar that week. For full marks at least ten seminar assignments must be submitted.

4. I have used the term "Class Community" instead of the more traditional 'seminar participation' because the term 'participation' does not sufficiently emphasize the importance of listening and presence for the success of our seminars. It is important that students contribute the discussion. It is equally important that students are present and listening.
