COURSE GUIDELINES & EXPECTATIONS

There is an emphasis in this course on class community. Students are expected to attend all classes. in person conversations with me are required for the course planning and study note grades.

Course Planning

Students will bring an example of their study notes to an appointment for a conversation with me. We will talk about their interests in and approach to the course work, and I'll give feedback on the study notes.

Study Notes

Students are required to assemble a package of their study notes twice. Note that these are not big writing assignments. The assignment is to submit a package of already completed work with two samples selected for emphasis in grading. A brief explanation of why the specific examples are chosen will accompany a proposed grade. Students will meet with me soon after the package is submitted so we can determine together if the work matches the proposed grade or if the grade needs to be revised upward or downward.

Writing Assignments

Students will choose the topics and style of assignment, either a) submitted as a collection of two or three robust short answers (4-600 words), or B) a short essay (1500-2000 words). Study questions and essay topics will be presented in class each week.
