CALENDAR DESCRIPTION

This course focuses on theoretical ethical issues (e.g., do animals have moral standing?) as well as applied ethics (e.g., is it morally acceptable to eat meat?). There will be a major emphasis on common logical errors in constructing arguments.

COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES / OBJECTIVES

Upon completion of this course a student will be able to:

- Describe and critically assess classical and new ethical theories such as ecofeminism, deep ecology, biocentric ethics, ecocentric ethics.
- Discuss issues in applied ethics, such as vegetarianism, reproductive rights related to human population growth, moral obligations in relation to atmospheric conditions and duties to future generations.

• Identify common errors in arguments, such as the careless use of certain terms and fallacious arguments. For example, students will be alert to arguments that depend on indefensible definitions of "alive" and narrow definitions of "ecosystem" and they will be on the lookout for the very common equivocal use of "natural" in arguments on environmental issues.

Midterm and Final Exam

The Midterm will take place on the date shown above. The Final Exam will be scheduled by the College in the final exam period. Either exam can be written on an alternative day or at an alternative time only in truly exceptional circumstances or with a documented accommodation (see below). If truly exceptional circumstances occur, this should be communicated to me as soon as possible before the exam in question.

Essay or Persuasive Letter

This assignment is to produce a 5-page ethical analysis of a class topic by taking up a position on an ethical issue in this class and defending it philosophically. The assignment may take one of two basic formats. One option is to write an academic paper. The other is to write a persuasive letter to a political or other authority. Whichever format is chosen, I ask to see a statement of the topic with which you will engage and an outline of the plan for engaging with it submitted for my feedback and approval by Oct. 20. Drafts will be accepted for feedback until November 3. The due date for the finished product will be November 17. Further details on the assignment will be located on D2L.

Weekly Seminar Activities

Each week except the week of the Midterm Exam we will have a seminar activity or activities scheduled in class. These activities may be group-based or individual. Completing any assigned seminar reading or other preparatory work is essential preparation for seminar assignments. Seminar readings and preparatory work can be found in the course schedule above. When required, preparatory work is normally to be submitted on D2L by noon on the day of seminar.

Completion of the preparatory work and active participation in seminar activities are expected and will be components of the grade for Weekly Seminar Activities. It is recognized that active participation may take different forms. Students should bring any concerns about their participation in seminar to me as soon as possible. A provisional grade for Weekly Seminar Activities will be assigned after the Midterm exam.

A note on attendance: to account for unpredictable and/or unavoidable absences, a maximum of one seminar this semester can be missed no questions asked, without any impact to final grades. Any other unexcused absences will affect your grade for weekly seminar activities unless there are truly extraordinary circumstances. Any truly extraordinary circumstances must be communicated to me as soon as possible.

Students are expected to attend all class meetings and to be engaged with class activities. Technology may aid but must not distract within the classroom learning environment. Students are responsible to acquire any information they missed as a result of missing class.
