CALENDAR DESCRIPTION

This course will introduce elementary formal logic. Students will learn the formal logical analysis of basic sentences and arguments. The focus will be on sentence logic and predicate logic; other topics in logic may be introduced. This course is excellent preparation for any standardized test, e.g. GRE, MCAT, LSAT, GMAT.

- 1. The text in this course is <u>Essentials of Symbolic Logic: 3rd Edition</u> by R. L. Simpson (Broadview Press, 2008). The work students submit in this course must use the symbols defined in this text and follow the procedures outlined in this text.
- Symbolic logic is naturally cumulative. It is necessary for students to understand Chapters 2 & 3 to be ready for the additional symbols introduced in Chapters 4 & 5.
- 3. There is a homework assignment to be completed for almost every class. The homework is to be done on paper and handed in at the beginning of class. If a student is late for class, their homework will be accepted only if it is handed in immediately upon their arrival.
- 4. If someone is unable to attend class in person due to illness or quarantine, if they are able to complete the assignments, they are asked to scan and email their homework to confirm it is completed on time. As soon as possible upon their return, students may submit the hard copies (either in class (see point 3) or in office hours) to be marked.
- 5. The lowest 25% of homework grades will be dropped to encourage students to learn from their mistakes. Any one who misses more than five homework assignments is asked to contact me as soon as possible to solve the problem.
- 6. There are two tests, one midterm exam on Chapters 2 & 3, and one final exam on Chapters 4 & 5. The final exam will be scheduled during the final exam period. The date of our exam will be posted by the college on February 18th.
- 7. The tests are open text book. This means that students may have access to their own copy of the Simpson text during the midterm and the final exam. Sharing text books during a test will not be permitted. While highlighting, short notations, and page markers are permitted, texts with copious notes written in them may not be used in tests.
