Reading Quizzes (RQ): 1% each; 10% total With each new chapter or reading students will be asked to complete an online multiple- choice quiz in the course D2L website (in the Quiz section). The quizzes will cover the reading for chat chapter. They must be completed prior to the start of that chapter's class. RQ will be due either on Wednesdays or Fridays depending on when a given chapter begins. The online submission window will close one hour prior to the start of that chapter's first class (11:30 AM). The answers for each RQ are available one day after that RQ closes. There will be 10 RQs throughout the semester; the lowest graded RQ will be dropped from each student's overall grade. Random Discussion Assignment (RDA): 2% each; 5 RDAs; 4 RDAs graded. Randomly throughout the semester students will be asked to discuss and consider a question from the class discussion or weekly readings. Students will submit a brief written answer (after in class beer discussion) on the topic to the appropriate D2L space. Students will not know the dates of the RDA. Five RDAs will occur (worth 2% each) throughout the semester. The four highest scoring RDAs will count towards the final grade. The scoring system will be simple: complete (100%); incomplete (0%). Attendance taken when RDAs occur. In Class Short Essay (ICCE): 20% per ICSE Students will write three ICSE during the semester. These essays will be written in class on the designated days. Student attendance on those days is required. A selection of four questions. Students will have approximately 75 minutes to write their answer. For more information, see the D2L content page.
