CALENDAR DESCRIPTION

This course examines some basic concepts in political science. Using examples from various countries, it introduces students to the nature of politics, government, the state, constitutions, international politics, political economy, human rights, and the process of democracy. It also examines different perspectives for understanding and evaluating the political world.

Describe the nature of political science, including key concepts: politics, governments, states, political cultures, and ideologies.

Identify basic governmental structures and processes: constitutions, federal and unitary systems, parliamentary and presidential systems, elections, politics and governance at the world level.

Identify basic political actors: political parties, interest groups, social movements, and the news media.

Describe the relationship between politics and the economy, the value of democracy (in both the developed and developing nations), and the future of politics at the world level.

Critically evaluate some aspect of political life. (Topics may change from semester to semester, but could consist of such things as democracy, human rights, civil disobedience, social democracy, political radicalism, etc.)

Course Tour Quiz (CTQ): At the start the semester, students will complete the Course Tour Quiz. The quiz will be worth 1%. The answers for the CTQ will be found in the course syllabus and various assignment documents.	1%
Reading Quizzes (RQ): With each new chapter or reading students will be asked to complete an online multiple-choice quiz in the course D2L website (in the Quiz section). The quizzes will cover the reading for that chapter. They must be completed at the start of that chapter's week. RQs will be due on Mondays at 4:30 PM. There will be 9 reading quizzes throughout the semester; the lowest graded RQ will be dropped from each student's overall grade.	9%
Discussion Posts (DP): 12% each; 1 per section; 3 DPs over of the course. With each new instructor podcast a few key concepts will be explained. Students will choose one of those concepts and apply that concept to a current event. This current event will need to have occurred within a month of the due date. Students will post a link to the news item and explain how the concept fits within the news item. Explanations should run approximately 200 words. Student will post three times during the semester; once in each of the three sections of the course. DPs will be due at the beginning of that week's topic – Mondays at 12:00 PM. Discussion Post Responses (DPR): 5% per DPC; 1 DPC evaluation per section; 3 DPCs over the course In one of two weeks where students will not make a DP (within a section of the course), students will be required to read students DP submissions and provide meaningful comments, questions, and contribute to that topic's discussion. Quality, depth, and thoughtful suggestion will be most prized. Students will be asked to provide DPRs in only one of the two weeks. Podcast Response (PR): 19% per PR; 2 PCR during the semester; PR1 due Feb. 21, PR2 due April 7 Students will respond directly to one of the instructor podcasts. They will take one key concept and explain how that idea works in their world. It is vital that students incorporate notions from the course (not from outside sources) into their response. Submissions can either be written response of approximately 300 words or they may submit an audio submission of no more than 3 minutes. See the D2L site for a full account of the Pod Cast Response assignment and evaluation.	38%
Engagement Self-Evaluation Quiz In weeks 5 and 10 students will be asked to arrange a brief online meeting with the instructor. During these weeks, instructor office hours will be expanded to encourage all students to connect. This effort will be included in the final participation grade. All students will be asked to make a meaningful contribution to class activities and demonstrate engagement with topic. There are numerous ways for students to express their engagement.
