In Class Short Essay Final (ICSEF): 20% A final short essay will be written on April 11. Like the previous ICSEs, students will know in advance the four topics in advance. Students will answer one of the four questions. The potential questions will examine the course as a whole. That is, the questions will draw from themes covered since the beginning of the semester.
