7. The basics of the electoral system, and possible alternatives, as well as the role of the press.

EVALUATION OF LEARNING

Marks will be determined based on the following work:

DESCRIPTION	WEIGHTING
Reading Quizzes (RQ): With each new chapter or reading students will be asked to take an online multiple-choice quiz in the course D2L website (in the Quiz section). The quizzes will cover the reading for that week. They must be completed prior to the start of that week's class. Students have one attempt to successfully complete each RQ. The online submission window will close one hour prior to the start of that week's first class – 7:30 AM on Monday. The answers for each RQ are available once that RQ closes (7:30 AM Mondays). There will be 10 reading quizzes throughout the semester; the lowest graded RQ will be dropped from each student's overall grade.	10%
Course Tour Bonus Quiz: At the start the semester, students will be asked to complete the Course Tour Bonus Quiz. This quiz will ask students about course syllabus, different assignments, collaborate, and other aspects of the course. The quiz will be worth up to 1%. The bonus marks will be added to the final score of the Reading Quiz.	1% (bonus)
Short Essays (SE): 20% per assignment Students will write three short essays (SE) of approximately 300 words each. A choice of questions will be posted at the beginning of each module. Students will answer one question from that module's selection. Short essays should be just as well-crafted as a standard essay. Late assignments will be penalized 10% per day. Take Home Final (THF): A final exam will consist of one take home essay due at 11:59 PM on Thursday April 20 . Students will have 3.5 days to compose an essay of approximately 500 words in length. Students will answer one short essay question (from a selection) which draws from themes covered since the beginning of the semester. The essay will be submitted through the course's D2L Assignment drop box. For more information, see the D2L content page.	29%
