# **EVALUATION OF LEARNING**

DESCRIPTION	WEIGHTING	
Reading Quizzes (RQ):		
With each new textbook chapter students will be asked to take an online multiple-choice quiz in the		
course D2L website (in the Quiz section). The quizzes will cover the textbook reading for that week.		
They must be completed prior to the start of that week's class. Students have one attempt to	12%	
successfully complete each RQ. The online submission window will close one hour prior to the start		
of that week's class – 5:00 PM on Wednesdays. The answers for each RQ are available once that		
RQ closes. There will be 9 reading quizzes throughout the semester; the lowest graded RQ will be		
dropped from each student's overall grade.		
In Class Short Essays (ICSE): 20% per ICSE		
Students will write two ICSE during the semester. These essays will be written in class on the		
designated days. Student attendance on those days is required.		
A selection of four questions will be posted at the beginning of each module. On the day of the in-		
class exam, only two questions (from the original four) will be available to answer. Students will		
select one of the two questions. Students will have approximately 80 minutes to write their answer.

Group Discussion Reading Quiz (GDRQ):		
Online multiple-choice reading quizzes that cover readings for that week's group		
discussion. These quizzes are to be completed one hour <b>prior</b> to the start of Wednesday's	6%	
class. Students have one attempt to successfully complete the GDRQ. There will		
be 4 GDRQs.		
Random Discussion Assignment (RDA): 1.5% each; 5 RDAs; 4 RDAs graded.		
Randomly throughout the semester students will be asked to discuss and consider a question from		
the class discussion or weekly readings. Students will submit a brief written answer (after in class		
peer discussion) on the topic to the appropriate D2L space.	6%	
Students will not know the dates of the RDA. Five RDAs will occur (worth 1.5% each) throughout the		
semester. The four highest scoring RDAs will count towards the final grade. The scoring system will		
be simple: complete (100%); incomplete (0%).		

DESCRIPTION	WEIGHTING
Website Project (WP): 35% (20% Individual Short Essay, 5% Group Work Plan, 10% Website Showcase)  The three-part project asks students to select a key idea from course (list provided) and as a group create a website that highlights key ideas from that theme. Individually students will respond with a short essay to a specific question that relates to their topic area. The short essay will run approximately 500 words. The WP Individual Short Essay is due March 16 at 11:59 PM. Groups will submit a work plan that explains how they will divide the project among their colleagues. The work plan will explain content and page layout. It will serve as a blue-print for the website. It is due February 17 at 11:59 PM. Along with two mandatory prep days, groups will showcase their completed websites on the last day of class April 10. Engagement Self-Evaluation Quiz All students will be asked to make a meaningful contribution to class activities and demonstrate engagement with topic. There are numerous ways for students to express their engagement. See the D2L site for a full account of participation grading.
