Reading Quizzes (RQ): (9%) With each new chapter or reading students will be asked to take an online multiple-choice quiz in the course D2L website (in the Quiz section). The quizzes will cover the reading for that week (a chapter or a reading) and must be completed prior to the start of that week's class. Students have one attempt to successfully complete each RQ. The online submission window will close one	9%	
hour prior to the start of that week's first class – 5:00 PM on Wednesdays. The answers for each RQ are available once that RQ closes (5:00 PM Wednesdays). There will be 10 reading quizzes throughout the semester; the lowest graded RQ will be dropped from each student's overall grade.		
Course Tour Bonus Quiz: (1% bonus) At the start the semester, students will be asked to complete the Course Tour Bonus Quiz. This quiz will ask students about course syllabus, different assignments, collaborate, and other aspects of the course. The quiz will be worth up to 1%. The bonus marks will be added to the final score of the Reading Quiz.	1% (bonus)	
Short Essays (SE): (20% per assignment) Students will write three short essays (SE) of approximately 300 words each. A choice of questions will be posted at the beginning of each module. Students will answer one question from that module's selection. Short essays should be just as well-crafted as a standard essay. Late assignments will be penalized 10% per day. A rewrite option for either short essay one or short essay two will be available. Students can revise, rewrite, and resubmit one of those two essays by Mar. 11 at 11:59 PM. Students must submit an initial short essay to become eligible for the re-write. For more information, see the Short Essay section of the D2L content page.

Video Project: 28% (15% Individual Short Essay, 13% Group Video submission)		
Students will register (through the D2L) into one of five groups. Student, individually, will write a short essay from one of the questions provided within the topic area. The individual submission is due March 8 at 11:59 PM.		
Collectively, groups will work together to shoot, edit, and narrate a short video. This video will define the key concept and demonstrate that idea in the world (in Victoria).		28%
Students will attend two preps days and a presentation day. Both prep days and the Showcase days are mandatory; attendance will be taken for all three days. The showcase day will occur on Wednesday April 12th. For more details, see the Assignment section of the D2L content page.		
Group Discussion: 2 % (1% Question Submission, 1% Leadership & Notes)		
Each student will lead one group discussion during the semester. Students will lead a handful (four to six) fellow students through a series of questions that apply to that week's group discussion. Students will sign up in advance to select the topic they wish to lead.		2%
Group Discussion leaders will submit three well considered questions one day in advance of their group discussion. These questions will guide the discussion to come.		270
Group leaders will lead their discussion and take notes from that discussion. These notes will be submitted within one day of the group discussion (Thursday at 6:00 PM).
