- i) discuss the communication skills required for effective collaboration with both Indigenous and non-Indigenous health care professionals, traditional medicine peoples/healers in the provision of effective health care for First Nation, Inuit, and Métis clients, families, and communities.
- j) describe specific communication strategies and approaches relative to clients with developmental disabilities.
- k) describe communication strategies to build positive relationships with children.
- l) compare communication practices for health beliefs among different Indigenous peoples.
- m) identify components that demonstrate a commitment to engage in dialogue and relationship building with different cultures, including cultural safety.
