Course Description:

This practice experience provides learners with the opportunity to integrate theory from Level I and II courses into practice. Learners will practice with aging clients and/or those with chronic illness in residential care settings. Medication administration, nursing care, organization, comprehensive health assessment, wound care and introduction to leadership are emphasized.

- deliver person-centered care that recognizes and respects the uniqueness of each individual, is sensitive to culture and diversity, and applies principles of trauma-informed practice.
- demonstrate various communication strategies in communicating with clients with cognitive, sensory and/or mental health disorders.
- collaborate with faculty to provide leadership, direction, assignment, and supervision of unregulated care providers in the residential care setting.
- advocate for change reflecting evidence-informed practice.
- identify own values, biases, and assumptions on interactions with clients and other members of the health care team.
- participate in continuous learning to maintain and enhance competence.
