

DESCRIPTION		WEIGHT
Assignments	- There will be 2 short papers assigned throughout the semester during the labs. Each of these assignments is worth 5% of the final grade. These assignments will require students to conduct various kinds of research including interviews, content analysis, and self assessment, and then summarize the results in a short report.	10%
Group Project	In teams of 3 to 4 students, groups will make a presentation on a current issue in Psychology (e.g., PowerPoint). Presentation details will be discussed in lab and guidelines will be provided. Groups will be formed early in the semester and time in lab will be devoted to group work.	15%
Lab Participation	Throughout the semester, you will be asked to answer open-ended questions, discuss with peers, or reflect on some of the material presented in the lab and related to lecture material. These short written activities will be completed in lab and graded as satisfactory or unsatisfactory. There will be at least one of these assignments each lab and in order to receive the full 5% you need to participate in at least 80% of these assignments. There will be no opportunities to make up these points as you as you can occasionally miss a lab and still receive the full 5%.
