

Quizzes 10%	 The quizzes consist of a total of 9 quizzes designed to encourage you to complete the necessary class readings and to study in advance of each test. Only your top 7 marks will count towards your grade. Because you can miss 2 quizzes and still obtain full marks for the quiz competent, there are no additional opportunities to complete make-up quizzes for any reason (including illness). Chapter Tests 65%	 There will be 3 Chapter Tests corresponding to the textbook, lecture PPT notes, and videos (see class schedule for dates). You are responsible for attending tests as scheduled. Tests will be completed in class beginning at 8:30 am. There is no class lecture afterwards. Tests are non-cumulative (i.e., they only cover material since the previous exam). Tests will include multiple choice and true or false questions. Test #1 will cover Chapters 5, 10, & 11 (worth 25%) Test #2 will cover Chapters 12, 13, & 14 (worth 25%) Test #3 will cover Chapter 15, & 16 (worth 15%)
Lab Exercises 25%	- Weekly labs (see class schedule for due dates) involving reading scientific papers, conducting interviews, and self-assessment. To make the concepts in this course more meaningful, some self-reflection questions will also be offered and graded as satisfactory or unsatisfactory. Activities will vary in worth between 1% to 3% each week and the final project on a current issue in psychology will be worth 5%. Students will have the option to work in groups on the final project. Guidelines on exercises and the final project will be provided in lab. Late submissions will receive a penalty of 10% per day.
