COURSE GUIDELINES & EXPECTATIONS

LECTURE FORMAT:

This course will consist of lectures presented to you during the scheduled class times. PowerPoint slides and lecture notes will be posted to D2L before class; however, additional content may be discussed in class. Therefore, it is important that you attend class and take further notes.

EXAMS:

The exams will consist of 80 multiple-choice and true-or-false questions. You must write the exams during the scheduled class time in person. You must inform me before an exam if you cannot write it at the scheduled time. A make-up exam will only be scheduled if you can provide documentation for your absence. The exams will not be cumulative.

PRACTICE EXAMS:

There will be four practice exams that must be completed online through D2L outside of class time. Practice exams will be due the night before each exam. The practice exams are open-book and there is no time limit for completing the practice exams. You will be allowed three attempts for each practice exam. Each practice exam will count towards two percent of your final grade ($4 \times 2\% = 8\%$). Practice exams will consist of 60 multiple-choice and true-or-false questions. Practice exams are noncumulative.

ASSIGNMENTS:

There will be four assignments that must be completed outside of class time and submitted through D2L. Detailed instructions regarding assignments will be posted to D2L. Assignments will require you to apply, analyze, and critically evaluate concepts discussed in lectures. Assignments will be due the night before each exam. Each assignment will count towards five percent of your final grade ($4 \times 5\% = 20\%$). Although you should aim to submit the assignments before or by the due date, each assignment has a built-in 48-hour extension. If you need an extension, you do not need to email asking for one—you automatically have a 48-hour extension.

MOCK PATIENT INTERVIEW:

During the semester you will be introduced to a mock patient during class (Dec. 02). Your task will be to ask the 'patient' questions to determine the disorder(s) you think he is presenting with and to take notes. At the end of the interview, you will then submit your determination along with a brief write up of the symptoms presented by the mock patient that led you to that determination. The mock interview will count towards eight percent of your final grade.
