COURSE GUIDELINES & EXPECTATIONS

LECTURE FORMAT:

This course will consist of lectures presented to you during the scheduled class times. PowerPoint slides and lecture reviews will be posted to D2L before class; however, additional content may be discussed in class. Therefore, it is important that you attend class and take further notes.

EXAMS:

The exams may consist of multiple choice and true or false questions. You must write the exams during the scheduled class time in person. You must inform me before an exam if you cannot write it at the scheduled time. A make-up exam will only be scheduled if you can provide documentation for your absence. The exams will not be cumulative.

ASSIGNMENTS:

There will be five assignments that must be completed outside of class time and submitted through D2L. Assignments will be due the night before each exam. Each assignment will count towards six percent of your final grade ($5 \times 6\% = 30\%$).

MOCK PATIENT INTERVIEW:

During the semester you will be introduced to a mock patient during class. Your task will be to ask this 'patient' questions to determine the disorder(s) you think they are presenting with and to take notes. At the end of the interview, you will then submit your 'diagnosis' along with a brief write up of the symptoms presented by the mock patient that led you to that diagnosis. The mock patient interview will count towards 10 percent of your final grade.
