DESCRIPTION		WEIGHTING
Quizzes (3 Quizzes)	There will be three quizzes in this course corresponding to the textbook, lecture PPT slides, and videos (see class schedule for dates). Of the three quizzes, the lowest grade will be dropped. Students are required to complete all three quizzes. Quizzes will consist of multiple choice and short answer questions.	50%
In Class Participation & Assignments	As an interpersonal relations course, an important part of learning involves exploration of material through class discussion and exercises. Approximately once or twice a week a short assignment will be completed within class with the purpose of applying the skills and ideas of the course. Students will have the option to work in pairs and/or groups of three. These short assignments will be graded as satisfactory or unsatisfactory. It is important that students have read the assigned chapters before class and feel prepared to share their thoughts on the material and to work on in-class activities. Students are expected to attend at least 80% of the class to receive full marks. There will be no opportunities to make up these points as you can occasionally miss a class and still receive the full 100%.	15%

DESCRIPTION		WEIGHTING
Reflection Journal	Students will keep a journal with one entry per week, in response to the topics covered in the class, TO A MINIMUM OF 10 ENTRIES. Journal entries should be approximately 100 words, either typed (double-spaced) or handwritten and can also include artwork. Reflection journals are an opportunity to describe one's reactions to the topics and critique one or two points. Specific reflection questions will be offered in class and students will be invited to reflect on and integrate the concepts with their personal experience. The journals will be due on the last day of class on December 7 th . As an option, please select "Assignments" from the My Tools drop down menu in D2L to submit your reflection journal online.	15%
Group Project	In teams of 2 to 3 students, there will be an opportunity to share with others a meaningful topic related to the course. To illustrate the aspect of interpersonal communication, teamwork, role plays, and class activities will be an essential part of the presentation. Presentation details will be discussed in class and guidelines will be provided on the course site as well as opportunities to explore different ways of representing knowledge. Groups will be formed during the middle of the semester and time in class will be devoted to group work.	20%
