COURSE GUIDELINES & EXPECTATIONS

A. Attendance:

Students registered and waitlisted will receive an email one week prior to the start of class. Be sure to reply to this email confirming your interest in this course. Registered students retain their seats and waitlisted students' names will remain on list until a seat becomes available.

If not feeling well be sure to stay home. All notes and material are posted in content in d2L.

B. Transcript Analysis Questions in (d2L) there is a transcript of a dyad listener and speaker. The listener demonstrates skills, roadblocks, and students are to analyze these by completing a series of questions. These questions are set up as a quiz and students write in quizzes. **10% of course.**

C. Ten Reflections including ten videos in Mind Tap and ten reflection activities in D2L. Mind Tap: to register for this electronic student resource: <https://login.nelsonbrain.com/course/MTPP-MWKZ-ODPR>

Students' view the video in Mind Tap and then complete a reflection activity on the same video in D2L. Video viewings and reflection activities are due prior to the writing of chapter quizzes. Videos are on the skills covered in textbook chapters 3-10. Each of the 10 reflections are worth 2% for **20% of course.**

D. Weekly Quizzes: There are weekly chapter quizzes that comprise 10 multiple choice and 10 true and false questions. The purpose is to ensure the student keeps up with the reading text material. The best scores on nine of ten quizzes **comprise 36% of course=4% each quiz.**

E. Discussion Posts: There are four discussion forums. Students are responsible for responding to one of the two questions. Within each forum, there are two questions to choose one. Students thread their response to fellow students, and then reply to an answer of one fellow student. A marking rubric is included to guide students' responses and evaluations. There are four forums, each worth 4%.

Total worth 16% of course.

E. Accumulative summary/Exam:

There is an examination on chapters one through ten. This exam comprises 78 multiply choice questions, similar to questions on the weekly chapter quizzes and 52 matching questions for a total of 130 points =83 questions. This exam is set up 15 minutes ahead of schedule, in order to login on D2L and ensure all devices are working and connected to WIFI. Due date of exam TBA
