Short Weekly Quizzes (4% each)

Each quiz will have 10 question (Multiple choice and True/False) and is worth 4% each. There will be 10 short quizzes throughout the semester and will be completed each week during the specified time period. For this semester you will have until April 11th at 11:59 PM to complete all quizzes and they will not be reopened for completion after this date. Material covered up to and including the class prior to the quiz is subject for inclusion in the quizzes. The quizzes are used as a tool to help you build your knowledge base each week and are a way to prepare you for the tests.

Discussion Groups: 2% each (10%)

There are five discussion groups scheduled this semester which are based on related course material. You are expected to work in groups to answer questions, with a one-two page summary to be submitted to the instructor at the end of the allotted time, and then a larger group seminar style discussion related to family and community issues. Each discussion group is worth 2% of your overall grade.

In-Class Presentation: 15%

Students are required to select one of the topics discussed in the course and relate it to a current issue/affair or community organization in the field of sociology of the family and give an in-class presentation based on your research work. It is necessary that you incorporate one of the main topics discussed in the course as a way to shed light on the issue. Please ensure that you supplement your presentation with added "credible" reference material — meaning, do not just use the textbook as your only source of information. The presentation is due the week that your topic is scheduled for class discussion. Students are required to work in groups and to submit **one** presentation electronically in power point for the group to the instructor the day you are scheduled to present; each presenter will also be graded individually during their presentation. Individual Mark 7.5% and Group Mark 7.5%.

Presentation Tips:

- 1. The presentation is shared equally among group members. <u>It must not exceed 30 minutes or marks will be deducted.</u>
- 2. You must use visual aids for your presentation i.e. power point
- 3. Do not copy every single word used in the textbook. Stress important points, and give reasons why you support or do not support the textbook's perspectives
- 4. Speak clearly, slowly, and articulately
- 5. Avoid continual reading from your notes, and make eye contact with your audience
- 6. Ask and answer questions part of your task is to facilitate group discussion
- 7. Present with confidence and remember to be yourself!

Midterm Test (20%):

The test will be a take home test from March 5-7, 2025. The test will consist of short answer questions, and one long answer. You will be tested on all material including assigned readings, lecture material, and video presentations.

Written Assignments: 5% each (15%)

There are three written assignments scheduled this semester which are based in related course material. You are expected to answer questions described below and then prepare **an individual 1-2 pages 12 font double spaced** typed assignment to be submitted to the instructor on the due date indicated in your course outline and D2L. Each written assignment is worth 15% of your overall grade. You will be required to provide APA citations for each of your assignment #2 and #3 response questions.

Assignment 1 – Connection to Community and Place

Prepare a 1-2 pages 12 font double spaced individual response that answers these questions which should be uploaded to D2L in the assignment folder.

There is a strong connection we have to local lands and waters. In this assignment you are required to select a local place in nature where you have a connection. In lieu of coming to class today I want you to take time to visit and reflect on the place that has special meaning for you and think about whose lands you are on. Specifically, in this assignment prepare a 1-2 page, single-spaced, 12-point font format submission where you introduce yourself briefly, tell me about the connection you have to this place, and whether you have or do not have a connection with the peoples whose lands you are on?

Assignment 2- Defining the Family

Prepare a 1-2 pages 12 font double spaced individual response that answers these questions which should be uploaded to D2L in the assignment folder. <u>You will be required to provide APA citations for each of your assignment response questions</u>

- 1) Define and explain how you define family
- 2) How would a Sociologist Define the Family?

Hint: This process helps you to understand the complexities of define and researching in the area of sociology of the family

Assignment 3 – Gender Roles and the Future of Families

Prepare a 1-2 pages 12 font double spaced individual response that answers these questions which should be uploaded to D2L in the assignment folder. You will be required to provide APA citations for each of your assignment response questions

- 1) Define Mother and Father. What are gender roles?
- 2) Do Father's Mother? Do Mother's Father?
- 3) What is the importance of gender roles within the family? What does the future of gender roles within the family look like?
