CALENDAR DESCRIPTION

This is an introductory course for students with little or no knowledge of Spanish. Students develop basic proficiency in oral expression, listening comprehension, reading, writing, and acquire a fundamental knowledge of grammar and vocabulary. Emphasis is on oral communication. Notes: Native speakers of Spanish or students with Spanish 12 may not enroll.

D2L activities– (15% of final grade)

Outside of class, you will complete ten online modules on our course D2L site to help you prepare for in-class speaking and listening practice. If you are anxious about speaking and listening in class, completing these online activities in advance of attending class (as is required) will help you feel more confident. After completing the exercises, you will be asked to submit a screenshot of your completed activity in the Assignments tab in D2L. (Instructions to follow). I encourage you to repeat the activities until you feel you have mastered the concepts and have achieved your best grade. **Late submissions will not be accepted** as these exercises are intended to keep you on track with the course material. However, you can always return to the modules for extra practice after the due date.

Listening assessments (5) – (20% of final grade)

Each chapter includes a listening quiz that consists of two parts:

1. Dictation: The instructor will read questions aloud and ask students to write down what they hear and then answer the questions in writing. You have access to this list of questions in advance on D2L.

2. Textbook audio recordings and videos: During the assessment, students will listen to audio tracks and/or view videos and answer written comprehension questions. You have access to most recordings and videos prior to the exams and are encouraged to practice with them frequently.

Mini-presentations (2) – (10% of final grade)

On two occasions during the semester, you will give a short oral presentation to a small group of classmates and answer several questions. This process will then be repeated two or three additional times that day in order to improve oral skills. You will need to submit an outline of these presentations for full marks. Please read the warning below concerning the use of online translators or help from proficient Spanish speakers when preparing these presentations, as this constitutes academic dishonesty.

Written tests (3) – (40% of final grade)

You will complete 3 written tests:

Test A (chapters 1 and 2)

Test B (chapters 3 and 4)

Test C (chapter 5 and several previous concepts)

Final video and script (1) – (15% of final grade)

You will prepare a script and video to showcase all you have learned during the semester. This project can be done individually, in pairs or in groups. You will be asked to compile situations we practice in the classroom into a final project that demonstrates your speaking mastery of all the areas covered in the course. Your work in SPAN 100 will prepare you for making this video and it does not require you to learn new concepts or look up new words or phrases; rather it is a summary project (in Spanish) of all the things you can talk about after completing SPAN 100. Please read the warning below concerning the use of online translators or help from proficient Spanish speakers to complete this project, as this constitutes academic dishonesty.

COURSE GUIDELINES & EXPECTATIONS

¡Bienvenidos a SPAN 100! Intended for true beginners, Spanish 100 is an introductory course designed to be followed by Spanish 101. During this term, we will cover chapters 1-5 of your textbook, *Aula Internacional Plus 1*. You will learn basic terminology related to many daily life interactions such as meeting new people, university and work life, family and home life, socializing, shopping, past-times, and travel-related vocabulary. In this course, you will also gain an introductory knowledge of some of the diverse cultures of the Spanish-speaking world through exposure to music, texts and video-clips.

This course is university transferrable to other institutions and is equivalent to UVic's SPAN 100A (<https://www.bctransferguide.ca/>). If you choose to continue with Spanish 101 at Camosun in the future, you will then complete the remaining four chapters of your textbook. Following these two courses, students are generally at an A1 ("Breakthrough") level of the CEFR scale (Common European Framework Reference for Languages). This proficiency level is an internationally recognized milestone that you can use to indicate your level to other institutions around the world. Attendance and your progress in the course:

Learning a new language requires self-discipline and a commitment to keeping up with the class. It is very difficult to catch up after falling behind in a language class and you are advised to attend all classes and stay current with the work day-by-day in order to make progress. **If you don't understand something, please see me immediately!**

Your learning in this course is based on consistent, active participation in class activities. Through instructor-guided activities in class you will have the opportunity to develop your speaking and listening skills as you practice and receive feedback from your peers and the instructor. This means **speaking in class on a regular basis, actively listening to your classmates, speaking often in small groups or sometimes to the whole class**. The exercises we practice together will build your skills, reduce anxiety, and help grow your confidence to complete the graded assessments in the course. As such, **attendance in class is essential** and you are unlikely to be successful in the course or to become proficient in the language without being present in class.

Illness, accident, family affliction and religious obligations are the only legitimate reasons to miss due dates for in-class assessments and presentations. If you are absent the day of such an activity, please contact me as soon as possible to discuss arrangements.

*****MUY IMPORTANTE (please read):**

WARNING: ¡Cuidado! (Careful!) All work submitted for this class must be your work and your work alone. This means other students, parents, tutors, teachers or any other proficient Spanish speaker should not be helping you complete your work nor check over any assignments you plan to submit.

In other words, you may only use the following approved resources to prepare your assignments: your textbook and class notes, paper dictionaries and online dictionaries (not translators) such as www.wordreference.com. These sources are useful if you want to look up individual words in Spanish and should be consulted as you study the language. Unauthorized online resources include, but are not limited to, Google Translate or any other online translator as well as any AI program such as ChatGPT.

It's never a good idea to include verb tenses or expressions you can't explain. The instructor reserves the right to ask you about your use of phrases and structures that students at your level are unlikely to be familiar with. An inability to answer appropriately may require an Academic Infraction Report to be sent to the Dean of the School of Arts and Science for further follow-up with you and the assessment will receive a mark of 0.
