CALENDAR DESCRIPTION

Students will develop the skills needed to effectively draw the human figure. Gesture, action lines, basic anatomy, proportion, foreshortening, contour, light, and shadow will be practiced. Students will gain the confidence needed to visualize, and then draw, the human figure from life or from memory. These skills have a direct application to visual storytelling in comics and graphic novels.

COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES / OBJECTIVES

Upon completion of this course students will be able to:

- 1. Analyze the structure of the skeletal system, musculature, and surface of the human form.
- 2. Produce realistic drawings of the human figure from life.
- 3. Draw from memory the human form from any angle in any pose.
- 4. Apply drawing skills to visual storytelling for comics, graphic novels, gaming, illustration, storyboards and animation.

Week 1 - September 8	Class number one will be an introduction to the course and you will be drawing your instructor as a gestural model. We will have a skeleton to pose and begin sketching. Assignment #1 - Skeleton drawing. You have until September 29th to draw a skeleton you are proud of. It's worth 20% of your final grade. Sketchbook introduction	
Week 2 - September 15	Class two - Skeletal Anatomy pt 1 - Blocking and balance. (Life Model)	
Week 3 - September 22	Class three - Skeletal Anatomy pt 2 - proportions/ landmarks/measurements. (Life Model)	
Week 4 - September 29	Class four - Skeletal landmarks/foreshortening. (Life Model) Assignment #1 Skeleton critique. Have your favourite skeleton drawing ready to hand in and have discussed in class.	
Week 5 - October 6	Class Five - Lighting and contour (life model). Introduce Assignment #2 - poses - much like your skeleton assignment, you have three weeks to create two poses that will be 25% of your final. Grade.	
Week 6 - October 13	Class Six - Forms and connections (life model)	
Week 7 - October 20	Class Seven - Muscle anatomy #1 - Torso (Life model)	
Week 8 - October 27	Class Eight - Muscle anatomy #2 - Head (Life model) Assignment #2 Poses Critique.	
Week 9 - November 3	Class Nine - Dramatic lighting and muscle anatomy #3 - Arms, legs, hands, feet (Life model) Introduce Assignment #3 - Figure - You'll have three weeks to complete a full figure drawing of your choice, worth 30% of your final grade.	
Week 10 - November 10	Class Ten - The figure with clothing #1 (Life model)	
Week 11 - November 17	Class Eleven - The figure with clothing #2 (Life model)	
Week 12 - November 24	Class Twelve - Drawing each other drawing each other. We will set up a meta-drawing class where life drawing, gestural drawing, and moving subjects draw YOU while you draw THEM.	
Week 13 - December 1	Class Thirteen - We'll be drawing from photographs today. We will pose for our own cameras and attempt to create dramatic comic book cover roughs using ourselves as the subject.

Week 14 - December 8	Week Fourteen - Last day of class. Assignment #3 - Figure is due as are your sketchbooks for review. We will be working on a life drawing jam comic as a class.
