Fundamental Computer Studies, delivered in a combination of face-to-face and online, will help students gain the confidence to perform basic computer operations. This course will also help them gain the computer and Internet and word processing skills they need to work in both traditional and online classroom (<u>http://camosun.ca/learn/calendar/current/web/comp.html</u>).

2. Intended Learning Outcomes

The students will be able to demonstrate the following skills:

- 1. Keyboarding
 - i. Use correct touch typing techniques and procedures for letters but not for top row numbers/symbols
 - ii. Demonstrate proper ergonomics
 - iii. Achieve an adjusted typing speed of 10 wpm
- 2. Basic Knowledge of Computers
 - i. List the basic parts of a computer system (system unit, monitor, keyboard, mouse, electronic storage device, USB port, and printer)
 - ii. Demonstrate the ability to properly start and shut down a computer system
 - iii. Demonstrate the ability to start and close a program
 - iv. Describe some uses of computers
 - v. Use a mouse
 - vi. Demonstrate the ability to operate a printer (power on, put on line/off line and load paper)
- 3. Word Processing
 - i. Create and format a new word processing document
 - ii. Edit a document
 - iii. Save a document
 - iv. Print a document
 - v. Retrieve a document
 - vi. Use tools such as a spell checker or thesaurus
- 4. Electronic Communication
 - i. Browse the Internet
 - ii. Search the internet
 - iii. Set up an email account
 - iv. Send and receive email
 - v. Demonstrate netiquette in email
 - vi. Complete an online form
- vii. Find and use an online map search tool

3. Required Materials

- (a) Texts: Materials will be available in online classroom.
- (b) Other: USB Memory Stick

4. Course Content and Schedule (Self-paced Instructions)

Classes are held in the Our Place computer lab every Wednesday morning from 9:00 to 11:50 a.m., starting September 14th and ending on December 18th. This course is designed to be completed in four month school term. Students are expected to spend a minimum of 10-12 hours per week in online and study time.

1	Introduction to Keyboarding	Practise with typing tutor program
2	Introduction to Basic Knowledge of Computers	Develop a basic understanding of how to operate a computer.

3	Introduction to Word Processing	Practise basic word processing skills
4	Introduction to Electronic Communication I	Browse the Internet as well as initiate and respond to emails.
