Class Structure:

To be successful in college level work, students also need to be able to work independently. In the online format, it can be challenging to work independently, so it is important to manage your time carefully. In this online class, you will work together with your class sometimes using Blackboard Collaborate; this is called a synchronous session. I will arrange these sessions beforehand. You will also work independently, but you will be required to participate in some online discussions that you will post in D2L; this will be asynchronous.



B. Temporary Grades

Temporary Grade	Description
I	Incomplete: A temporary grade assigned when the requirements of a course have not yet been completed due to hardship or extenuating circumstances, such as illness or death in the family.
IP	In progress: A temporary grade assigned for courses that are designed to have an anticipated enrollment that extends beyond one term. No more than two IP grades will be assigned for the same course.
CW	Compulsory Withdrawal: A temporary grade assigned by a Dean when an instructor, after documenting the prescriptive strategies applied and consulting with peers, deems that a student is unsafe to self or others and must be removed from the lab, practicum, worksite, or field placement.
