#### **ELD 072 COURSE OUTLINE**

This course, designed for non-native speakers of English, focuses on reading strategies and on the writing process. It is designed to prepare the student for further academic study. The course provides instruction and practice in the fundamentals of reading comprehension and academic writing.

  - Choose topics that go beyond personal experience and reflect general world knowledge.
  - Write descriptive, narrative, and expository prose.
  - Present logical and unified thought in paragraphs and essays.
  - Demonstrate an ability to link ideas.
  - Locate, access, and select appropriate information from a variety of sources.
  - Acknowledge sources of information.

#### 2. Grammar and Mechanics

- Identify and use accurate grammar and sentence structure.
- Use correct spelling and punctuation.

- 3. Read and Comprehend selected texts:
  - Find and use information and ideas from a variety of texts.
  - Identify the main points and supporting details in assigned texts.
  - Compare and contrast specific aspects of assigned texts.
  - Comprehend assignments and exam questions.
  - Prepare simple summaries and paraphrases from written sources.
  - Use beginning strategies to cope with the amount and variety of new vocabulary presented in college and university level courses.
- 4. Understand and function within the culture of a Canadian post-secondary classroom.
  - Prepare and present an organized oral presentation relevant to purpose and audience using appropriate audiovisual supports.
  - Demonstrate respect for learner colleagues, including those from differing cultural and linguistic backgrounds.
  - Collaborate with others in group tasks and discussions.
  - · Abide by the concept of academic honesty.
  - Perform basic word processing and formatting.

# 2. Required Materials

**Textbook:** Advance in Academic Writing 1 + My eLab, Steve Marshall, Pearson-ERPI

**Novel:** *The Giver*, Lois Lowry, 1993

**Recommended:** Longman Dictionary of Contemporary English for Advanced Learners or another high-quality English-English dictionary for advanced English learners

#### 4. Basis of Student Assessment

Your mark will be based on a variety of assignments and assessments given over the course of the semester. You must complete all assignments and submit them on time. You need to obtain 60% in both the reading and in the writing assessments to pass ELD 072. Participation, out-of-class assignments, and guizzes are not included in this calculation.

Three reading and summary tests – 50%	In-class paragraph – 10%
Novel tests – 20%	Compare/contrast essay – 20%
Short assignments on the novel – 10%	Cause and effect essay -20%
Vocabulary quizzes – 10%	Research report – 25%
Reading practice/homework/participation – 10%	Grammar exercises/quizzes – 15%
