#### CALENDAR DESCRIPTION

Students will learn to develop reading strategies: preview, survey, pre-read; use context clues and self-question to clarify meaning; employ critical thinking skills to distinguish fact from opinion; and summarize short passages. Students will begin to create paragraphs and use varying verb tense and word forms. Students will advance lifelong learning practices such as goal setting and gain an understanding of Indigenous ways of knowing and world views. Students will practice learning skills for oral communication, critical thinking, social responsibilities, personal and cultural identity, and time and work management.

#### **EVALUATION OF LEARNING**

This course focuses on promoting literacy skills in reading bsuch as developing purposeful reading strategies, using context clues, and employing critical thinking skills. Writing literacy is developed through using paragraph format and practicing strategies to learn new words. Students will build a portfolio of their work to be used as an evaluative tool in the assessment of their progress in the course.

This course uses the Competency Based Grading System on students' successful completion of the course learning outcomes.

### **COURSE GUIDELINES & EXPECTATIONS**

This is a self-paced course. Students have the flexibility to follow an individually-adaptable timeline to complete the learning outcomes and assignments. The course is a combination of 6 in-person hours per week with an expectation of studying another 4 hours per week. Students have a responsibility to work hard, attend class, participate in class discussions or projects, and ask for support when needed.
