PSYCHOLOGY 130 ASSIGNMENT INSTRUCTIONS

All assignments should be typed if possible. All assignments must be on time or there may be a penalty. See me before they are due, not after. Good papers are usually clear, concise, and comprehensive. Assignments can also be sent by email as an attachment in a MSWord compatible format.

WRITTEN ASSIGNMENTS (THREE) 45%

There will be 3 assignments covering the material in the radio shows, reading, student panels, and videos. These are basically take-home quizzes that will test your knowledge of the material and your ability to apply that knowledge to contemporary social problems. They will be short answer type questions, approximately 3 pages long (1000 words). The questions will be available from the library reserve, on the internet, or at my office. Please turn them in under my office door if I am not there, or by email.

MIDTERM 20%

The midterm will be 1 hour long and will cover material from the radio, readings, and videos. There will be short essay (paragraph) and short answer (2-3 sentences) questions. An in-class review session will be held before the exam and a written study guide will be available.

FINAL EXAM 25%

The final exam will be two hours long and will cover the material from the radio, text and videos. The exam will cover only the material from after the midterm. There will be short essay (paragraph) and short answer (2-3 sentences) questions. An in-class review session will be held before the exam and a written study guide will be available.

STUDENT PANEL DISCUSSION 10%

The student will prepare for and participate in a discussion to be broadcast on the radio, led by the instructor and involving 3 to 4 other students, on a specific topic. For the panel participants, the day of the panel a one page written summary is due laying out the basic ideas that the student will be discussing on the show. Evaluation will be based on preparation for and participation in the discussion, knowledge and awareness of the topic, and the written summary. Dates for recording and topics for discussion will be provided.
