5. Basis of Student Assessment (Weighting)

Students will write chapter tests on all lessons of <u>Ensemble : grammaire</u> from Chapter 7 up to and including Chapter 11 and the mini- review (ch.1). Students are expected to complete the exercises in the grammar book and do the necessary oral review with monitors. Dates of tests will be confirmed in class; because of the oral component of the tests, there is no late writing.

Written assignments are due once a week following the weekly readings in <u>Exploration</u>: Schunk/Waisbrot (10 minimum).

Two 1000-word essays are to be handed in, on Ionesco: (La cantatrice chauve) and

Molière: (Le bourgeois gentilhomme).

(a) Assignments: 10%

(b) Oral participation: 15%

(c) Essays: 15% (Ionesco= 5% - Molière = 10%)

(d) Tests: 60%
