Quizzes

Oral Examination/Presentation

There are two parts. One is to make a 3-minute speech (25 sentences) and answer some questions based on what he/she presents. the other is to answer 10 questions out of the 100 questions in the Text Supplement.

Mid-term/Final Examinations

The mid-term will be given during the regular class hour. the final exam will take place during the examination week.
