Course Objectives

This course examines the application of psychology to contemporary social issues. Topics will include social influence, social stereotypes, prejudice, gender, media, crime and violence. The goal will be to investigate the nature of social problems, analyze the causes, and propose possible solutions.

Course Organization

Each week there will be a 2-hour lecture (with the whole class) and a 1-hour seminar participation in small groups.
