In this course you will learn to:

- 1. Discuss the trends in human evolution and the role of natural selection in the evolution of our species.
- 2. Outline the relationships among culture, biology, and environment in examining human health and disease.
- 3. Explain the importance of archaeological investigation to contemporary societies.
- 4. Recognize and explain to others that our culture constructs our realities so that social inequality, for example, is a human invention.
- 5. Identify key features of language.
- 6. Use the World Wide Web to investigate anthropological evidence.
- 7. Debate issues of human biology, society, and history using anthropological evidence.
- 8. Critically evaluate evidence used to explain the human past and present.
- 9. Address ethnocentrism as a barrier to understanding other cultures.
- 10. Acquire a tolerance and respect for cultural and biological diversity.

All three tests must be written in order to achieve a passing grade in Anthropology 104. Tests must be written during scheduled times unless I am presented with a physician's medical certificate. If a makeup test is scheduled because of illness, students must write the makeup test on the make-up test date. Only one make-up test date will be scheduled. Without a medical certificate, the makeup will not be further rescheduled. Unavailability of textbook or pressure of other work does not constitute a reason for missing tests. Students will not be permitted to write a makeup test in order to improve a grade.

The three tests consist of multiple choice questions and short answer questions: e.g. defining or identifying terms or concepts and giving their significance; explaining a true/false or multiple choice answer; listing factors or characteristics in point form; filling in blanks.

Instructions for Discussion Papers: Discussion Paper A

Each of the first four discussion papers must be 250 words or one printed page, double-spaced, 12 point Times New Roman. Do not exceed one page. Each paper will be written in your own words and include the following:

- A title page containing a full bibliographic heading for the article, your name and I.D. number, and the date.
- A short summary of the purpose of the article, the problem addressed, major findings, and the author's conclusions.
- A critical discussion of what you found most interesting in the article, what you learned from the article, and what questions or problems you found in the author's arguments. Also include how the application of anthropology was useful, and to whom.
- Specific examples or quotations from the article to illustrate your comments. **Quotations must be cited and in quotation marks.** Consult the *Style Guide for the Social Sciences* on reserve in the library for details on parenthetical citations.

Grading: By handing in each completed discussion paper at the beginning of the class on the day it is due, you will receive 1 mark. The other 4 marks will depend on the content of each discussion paper, your writing style, and the presence of an acceptable title page. **Two marks** will be deducted from late papers, including papers handed in after the start of class on their due date. Papers handed in more than two school days after they are due will receive a grade of zero. There will be no extensions and no exceptions without a written medical certificate. Students will not be permitted to revise or re-write a discussion paper to improve their mark.
