#### **Intended Learning Outcomes**

Through reading textbooks and primary source materials, hearing faculty lectures, participating in seminars, writing papers, making presentations, and performing tests, students will:

- gain an understanding of critical themes, events, and issues in the construction of Canada since 1867
- 2. explore Native-European relations, relations between French and English Canadians, and between them and other ethnic groups
- 3. examine political challenges and changes
- 4. explore the development of national consciousness, the legacy of British colonial control and its transformation
- 5. examine Canadian-American relations, Canada's place in the world, and its participation in wars
- 6. evaluate economic, cultural and social development
- reassess and challenge traditional and existing perspectives on critical events and issues of this period

By the end of the course, through exposure to the above materials and ideas, the student should:

- be able to think critically about historical issues and writing by evaluating the arguments put forward by historians, weighing the evidence they present and making judgements about the strength of their arguments
- 2. have gained an appreciation of history as a distinct academic discipline, understanding its unique outlook, scope and methods and what distinguishes it from other disciplines
- be able to use history to confront the issues of today's world, establishing a context for the
  present and comprehending the accomplishments, failures, tensions and issues of the
  present era
- 4. have developed skills in research, and written and oral communication.

Students are expected to attend all classes, read assigned material and be prepared to discuss it in class. It is the student's responsibility to ensure assignments are turned in on or before the due date. Students are encouraged to ask questions and to meet with the instructor to discuss assignments or to seek clarification.

#### **Course Content and Schedule**

Classes will consist of lectures and seminars. The entire class will meet on Tuesdays for lecture but will be divided into two sections (A or B) for Thursday's seminar groups. Seminars are discussion groups. You will be required to read articles and to come to class prepared to discuss those articles.

Seminars: Thursday 2:30 – 3:20 pm (section A) Thursday 3:30 – 4:20 pm (section B)

The class schedule (following) indicates the subject of each lecture and the readings that coordinate with that lecture. It also details the topics for seminar readings, and the dates of assignments and exams.

#### **Basis of Student Assessment (Weighting)**

#### <u>Assignments</u>

**20% - Document Analysis** (instructions attached) Due **Tuesday February 10th**. *I will not accept late assignments without a doctor's note*.

20% - Article Review and conducting of seminar (15% for written article review and 5% for conducting seminar)— due on the date we discuss the article in class. You will select an article from the readings we will cover following the mid-term examination (instructions attached). In addition to preparing a written article review, students submitting reviews will conduct the seminar. Therefore, it is expected students will work together to plan their approach. Student attendance is mandatory on the day they submit their article review.

# Exams

**20% - Mid-term Exam –Tuesday February 24th**. The exam will consist of short answers questions and essay questions. One week prior to the exam I will hand out a study guide.

**25% – Final Exam** – to be held during the final exam period (same format as mid-term). You will receive a study guide during the last week of classes.

## <u>Other</u>

**15% - Seminar participation** – oral participation during seminars will be graded based on the quality of your participation, not the quantity. Therefore, read the articles, come prepared to discuss the author's thesis, main points and the evidence used. As a guideline, I have prepared a number of seminar questions for you to think about.
