COURSE CONTENT

PSYCHOLOGY APPLIED TO CONTEMPORARY SOCIAL PROBLEMS (Calendar Description)

This course applies knowledge in psychology to current social problems. Topics such as education, the nature of madness, health, terrorism, drug abuse, AIDS, violence and the urban scene may be considered. Students will be asked to work on several social problems with methods that will prepare them to be actively involved in society. Topics vary with instructor and changing social problems. **Prerequisites:** English 12 or assessment.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

At the end of the course, the student shall:

- 1. demonstrate the acquisition and command of terms and concepts used in psychology.
- 2. demonstrate an understanding of some social problems.
- 3. demonstrate acceptable verbal and writing skills required to:
 - a) arrive at logical inferences and conclusions from collected data.
 - b) make impartial studies of psychological topics.
- 4. demonstrate the skills required to actively contribute to class discussion, work in groups, and make effective class presentations
- 5. demonstrate an understanding of course content through written examinations.
- 6. apply psychological theories to personal experience.
- 7. analyze psychological topics from a variety of perspectives.
- 8. learn how social problems apply to his/her personal life.

COURSE ORGANIZATION

1. There are two hours of lecture each week

2. There is one, one-hour seminar per week. (Your student class schedule informs you of which seminar you are assigned.)

You must attend the seminar assigned to you on your class schedule registration form.

TESTS:

- 1. There will be five quizzes that will be announced at least one class session in advance of the quiz date. Two of the quizzes will graded and three will simply be checked-off as inclass activities. Those graded will be worth 50 points each and the check-off activities will count for 5 points each.
- 2. There will be a midterm exam and a final quiz Details will be discussed in class.
- 3. Multiple choice quizzes and exams expect you to apply the terms & concepts of the course, not just recognize definitions. There will be no make-up opportunities for tests missed without a doctor's note.

ACTIVITY POINTS

There will be random, brief, in-class activities worth 5 points each. You must be in attendance to participate in the activity. There will be no make-up opportunities for class activities missed without a doctor's note. **PARTICIPATION**

Seminar Presentation – Social Issues:

In teams of three or four students, you will be asked to summarize the chapter for the week and then make a presentation to your seminar group on a social issue that relates to the content of the chapter. Seminar Presentation details will be discussed in seminar and guideline sheet provided at that time. Seminar teams will be formed during the first week of classes.

2. The final grade will be weighted as follows:

HOW I GRADE

- 1. Grades combine the college definition and my own experience.
 - A: Superior levels of achievement. I expect quality which shows a full understanding of the work, and which also includes exceptional achievement (i.e. new insight, obvious quality research, clear presentation above and beyond the minimum required, better work than the majority of the class).
 - **B: High levels of achievement.** For a B, I use work that is good and shows full understanding. It does not have the same degree of exceptional achievement that makes an A, but is distinctly beyond the minimum required.
 - C+: Satisfactory level of achievement.
 - C: Sufficient level of achievement to proceed with next level of study. Average work, showing an understanding of the material and the minimum requirements have been met. It does not indicate the student is having any real difficulties.
 - **D:** Minimum level of achievement for which credit is granted; a course with a D grade cannot be used as a prerequisite. I give this grade for work that is handed in, lacking all required details, but has some approximation of adequate work.
 - F: Minimum level is not achieved.

REGRADING AND RESUBMISSION

- 1. If you are not satisfied with a grade I have given, you have the right to ask me to regrade the work. After my reviewing the work you may receive a higher grade, a lower grade, or the same grade.
- 2. I reserve the right to ask you to resubmit work, or to show me extra material related to it. In either case, the maximum mark I will give will be C+.
