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Course Description: Calendar

This course applies knowledge in psychology to current social problems. Topics such as education, the nature of madness, health, terrorism, drug abuse, AIDS, violence and the urban scene may be considered. Students will be asked to work on several social problems with methods that will prepare them to be actively involved in society. Topics vary with instructor and changing social problems. **Prerequisites:** English 12 or assessment.

Format of the Course

Tests:	point each, short up to 20 points fo	tests, each comprised of 15 multiple choice questions worth 1 answers adding up to 15 points and 2 longer answers adding or a total of 50 points per test. They are not cumulative, and 3% of your final grade.
Assignments:	There are three, 1-2 page take-home assignments that will reflect a contemporary application of the chapter content for that week. They will be graded according to a set of criteria that will be handed out with the first assignment. Each will be worth 5% of your final grade.	
Presentation:	Groups will be set up on the second day of classes and the project/presentation will be handed out and explained at that time. It will be worth 20% of your final grade. A schedule for the presentations will also be set up at that time.

Website and other resources

The knowledge base for this course can be seen as coming from three different sources:

- textbook: important resource for core concepts and descriptions of major studies
