Course Description:

This course is an introduction to the development of the Asia-Pacific region in the modern period. Through a series of lectures, it will trace the political, economic, cultural and social developments of the various countries and areas of the Pacific, including East Asia, Southeast Asia and Oceania. Special emphasis will be placed on understanding the issues of development, nationalism, democracy, class, gender, and cultural identity.

- 1. the physical landscape, cultural heritage and identities of the different areas of modern Asia-Pacific:
- 2. the roles of history, literature, art, religion and philosophy of different areas of modern Asia-Pacific.

- 4. the divergent economic systems, policies and development patterns in modern Asia-Pacific.
