## Choices for Group Class Presentation English 286

Each group will have three people. Choose from the 12 groups. Your home paper (1500 words) will develop from the substance of your talk in the group, so pick the topic that most interests you.

- 1. How *Brave New World* has its roots in some of Huxley's essays, especially the Abroad in England series published in 1931. (All essays available from me).
- 2. Irony in Muriel Spark's "You Should've Seen the Mess" and 3 Hardy Poems.
- 3. No Man's Land. Using archival materials available from me—(love letters, letters to friends or acquaintances, newspaper articles, other documents), determine how they clarify theme, plot, and related aspects of Greene's long story.
- 4. World War I poems: Examine the sassoon, Owen, or women poets seminar on Oxford University Website <a href="http://www.oucs.ox.ac.uk./ltg/projects/jtap/tutorials/intro/index/html">http://www.oucs.ox.ac.uk./ltg/projects/jtap/tutorials/intro/index/html</a> Give an in-class talk on either Owen's "S.I.W. or Sassoon's "Does it Matter?" and "Base Details", or "Munition Wages" or "Wind on the Downs". Then discuss several poems in your home paperfeatured on the Owen, Sassoon, or Women poets tutorials. Remember to stick to just one of the three tutorials.
- 5. Technique and theme in 2 stories by Katherine Mansfield.
- 6. How Huxley's play *Now More Than Ever* shares a main theme with *BNW*.
- 7. Clockwork Orange as Menippean satire.
- 8. Discuss Lady Chatterley's Lover and related chapters of Women in Love as dystopian satire.
- 9. In what ways is the 1949 film *The 3<sup>rd</sup> Man* a sequel to *No Man's Land*?
- 10. Frankenstein theme in She Devil.
- 11. A common theme in Larkin's poetry.
