5. Basis of Student Assessment (Weighting)

COURSE OUTLINE (continued)

Students will write chapter tests on all lessons of <u>Ensemble : grammaire</u> up to and including Chapter 6. Because of the oral component of the tests, there is no late writing; the dates of tests will be confirmed in class.

Written assignments in <u>Ensemble : Littérature</u> will be explained in class and are due once a week (10 minimum).

The final percentage will be based on 60% for tests, 10% for literature assignements, 15% for one 1000-word essay based on the contemporary novel : <u>L' étranger</u> by A. Camus, and 15% for class preparation and participation.
