At the end of the course students will be able to:

1. demonstrate increased understanding and musicianship skills that will strengthen the demands in their instrument/voice.

3. Required Materials

4. Course Content and Schedule

2 class hours per week; 2 out-of-class hours per week

Content includes: 1. Intervals—identify any melodic interval within the octave

2. Chords: identify in closed position, major and minor triads; dominant and diminished sevenths in any inversion

- 3. Cadences: Identify by symbols Perfect, Imperfect, and Deceptive
- 4. Dictation: write out a simple 8 measure melody, a sequence of five chords in SATB chorale style, the upper and lower rhythms of a 2-part passage
- 5. Noticing differences: Identify changes in pitch, rhythm, dynamics, and articulation in a short musical excerpt
- 6. Keyboard skills: Play a simple melody and improvise an accompaniment using pop chord symbols.
- 7. Improvise: A melody on a given motive, with instrument or voice, at least 16 measures
- 8. Transposition: a melody, at sight, on an instrument of choice, up to a major second up or down.
- 9. Melody playback: Play or sing back the upper or lower voice of a 2 part phrase, in a major or minor key.
- 10. Scales: Sing major, minor (natural, melodic, and harmonic) and pentatonic scales ascending and descending with letter names, solfege, or numbers
- 11. Sight-sing: A melody in a major or minor key, treble or bass clef, with solfege syllables.
- 12. Conducting: sight conduct and intone a given rhythm while maintaining a moderate to fast tempo.

5. Basis of Student Assessment (Weighting)
