Intended Learning Outcomes

Knowledge Outcomes:

- 1. Introduce the concepts of culture and society such that they may be applied to critical understandings of everyday life.
- 2. Describe and contextualise the rise of anthropology as an academic discipline and profession from a historical perspective.
- 3. Describe the relationship between anthropological theories and methods.
- 4. Engage critically with 'current events' and be able to read these against both centrist and marginal thought.
- 5. Understand the linkages between imperialism and colonial history alongside contemporary globalisation and the postcolony.
- 5. Appreciate the challenges of ethnocentrism within Canada's and other countries' multicultural policies.

Skills Outcomes:

- 1. Employing the perspectives learned in class, be able to reflect on one's own social and cultural position vis-à-vis others.
- 2. Building upon the ethnographic and anthropological literature encountered in readings and in class, be encouraged to research and write papers in an anthropological perspective and style.

Basis of Student Assessment (Weighting)

Assignment 'ScrapBook' (10%)

Skim newspapers and magazines for topics of anthropological concern. During class presentations, you will be asked to critique the newspaper or magazine article using concepts you have learned in class. **Due:** In-class presentations, April 4-6 and April 11-13.

Participation (5%)

Because the key method in social and cultural anthropology is premissed on participant-observation, participation in class discussion and attendance cannot be stressed enough. Your absence will be noted.

In-class Film Review (10%)

After watching ethnographic films in class, you are asked to provide a film review, no more than two pages in length which demonstrates that you can critically assess a cultural representation and use existing theoretical frameworks to do so. **Due:** Apr 6 (at the beginning of class).

Take-Home Exam (25%)

This take-home exam will challenge you to write well-structured and effectively researched essay questions in your own environment. **Due:** Handed out March 8 (ANTH 220-002) and 9 (ANTH 220-001), due in during class on March 15 (ANTH 220-002) and 16 (ANTH 220-001).

Final Exam (50%)

Exams must be written during the scheduled times unless a physician's medical certificate is presented to the instructor. *Without this document, there will be no exceptions*. Students will not be permitted to write an additional make-up exam in order to improve a grade. The final exam will be written during the exam timetable after the last week of classes in April. *Do not make holiday travel plans until the exam timetable is posted*.
